FIRST SATURDAY DEVOTION

First Saturday of every month beginning at 7:00 am

On the first Saturday of every month, St. Stanislaus Parish honors Our Lady of Fatima by praying The First Saturday Devotion. Confessions begin at 7:00 am. The Rosary begins at 7:40 am and is followed by Mass at 8:00 am. There are 15 minutes of meditation on the Rosary after Mass. Everyone is welcome.

EUCHARISTIC ADORATION

24 hours a day, 7 days a week in the adoration chapel

St. Stanislaus Parish has been in perpetual Eucharistic Adoration for over 37 years. If you are interested in signing up for a private Holy Hour, please contact the parish office for a list of available hours. Public Eucharistic Adoration and Benediction is done on Fridays during the school year. Contact the school office for details on dates and times.

STATIONS OF THE CROSS

The purpose of this parent and teacher organization is to foster improvement and understanding in our parish school. All parents with children in school are members. Three meetings are usually held during the school year with one held shortly after school starts in the fall. Such meetings are published in the parish bulletin and the St. Stanislaus Star from school. The organization helps students, parents, and teachers in communication and support.

ST. STANISLAUS STAR

The purpose of this publication is to provide parents with classroom information, schedules, meeting dates, etc. The school office publishes the newsletter once a week.

ATHLETICS PROGRAM

Athletics programs provided through the Parochial Athletics League (PAL) include boys and girls basketball (5th- 8th), girls volleyball (5th-8th), archery (4th-8th), cross country (4th-8th), and track. The PAL program also independently offers football to grades 5-8.

AFTER SCHOOL CARE

This program offers supervised childcare for St. Stanislaus students on a daily or drop-in basis when school is in session. The after-school program begins at 3:00 pm and is available until 5:30 pm. For more information contact the school at 573-636-7802.

SCRIP

The scrip program is run by parent volunteers to help raise funds to benefit St. Stanislaus school. Gift certificate cards in different denominations are available from nearly a hundred vendors. A number of the frequently used vendor cards are kept on hand others can be ordered within a few days to one week. Many parishioners and school families purchase these as gifts or as use in their monthly spending. St. Stanislaus is able to profit by buying these certificates at a discounted value and selling them at face value. A portion of the profit goes toward the admission fee of the family purchasing the scrip (or a family they designate) the rest of the profit goes towards school funds. Forms are available at www.ststan.net on the school side of the website. Requests can be obtained by sending in an order with school children or by stopping by the school office. The scrip program is also available via an app. Emily Bailey and Jill Mingucci run the program and additionally, the school office (573-636-7802) can be contacted with questions.

SACRAMENTS

BAPTISM

Parents are encouraged to have their children baptized within a few weeks of birth. There is a baptism class for those who are requesting baptism for their infant. Parents requesting the Sacrament of Baptism must be registered members of St. Stanislaus, if not, they must obtain permission of their pastor to have their child baptized at St. Stanislaus. Godparents must be practicing Catholics. If they are not members of St. Stanislaus, they need to obtain a letter of good standing from the pastor of their parish. If two godparents are chosen, one must be a man and the other a woman (Code of Canon Law 873). Godparents must be confirmed and be at least sixteen years old. Adults seeking baptism or membership in the Catholic Church should contact the parish office.

CONFIRMATION

Confirmation in the Diocese of Jefferson City is conferred on individuals who are in seventh grade. Confirmation is a completion of the sacrament of initiation that began at baptism. Preparation for confirmation takes place at St. Stanislaus School or in the PSR program. Confirmation candidates must provide a certificate of baptism and choose a sponsor. The sponsor must be a confirmed and practicing Catholic. If from a parish other than St. Stanislaus, the sponsor must provide a letter of good standing from the pastor of their parish.

CONFESSION

All Catholics are required to receive the sacrament of Reconciliation at least once a year to fulfill their Easter duty. Also, to receive Holy Communion Catholics must be in a state of grace. This means that anyone in a state of mortal sin must go to confession before they can approach the altar to receive our Lord Jesus in Holy Communion. Confession is available every Saturday from 4:00 to 5:00 pm. There is confession on the first Saturday from 7:00 to 8:00 am. There are communal penance services offered at St. Stanislaus during Advent and Lent. Msgr. Cox is available for confession by request as well. The children of the parish prepare for confession in the second grade either at St. Stanislaus School or in the PSR program.

FIRST HOLY COMMUNION

The normal age for First Holy Communion is the age of reason or seven years old. Children are prepared for First Communion in the second grade at either St. Stanislaus School or in the PSR program. If for some reason your child missed this opportunity and you would like them to be able to receive this sacrament, please call the parish office and we will come up with a plan to prepare your child.

ANOINTING OF THE SICK

Anointing of the Sick is normally for those with serious illnesses or who are approaching death. St. Stanislaus has a communal anointing of the sick in February, or if needed, a person can contact Msgr. Cox at the parish office. If you are aware of an upcoming serious surgery, please make arrangements, if possible, to be anointed before going to the hospital. If you are admitted to the hospital and in need of a priest, please contact the parish office as there is no way for us to know if you don't inform us. Please be aware that hospitals and nursing homes do not contact the parish unless you ask them to. Only a priest or bishop can do the anointing of the sick.

HOLY MATRIMONY

Wedding dates cannot be confirmed until couples have talked with the pastor. Marriage is a very serious commitment so we ask for at least six months' notice. There is some preparation involved in this sacrament. The couple does an online "Prepare and Enrich" assessment and goes over the results with the pastor or a trained couple. The engaged couple will need to do a marriage information program. Most often this is the Pre-Cana program which takes a full day on a Saturday.

There is an introductory Natural Family planning session which is online. The couple chooses music and plans the wedding with the help of the pastor and the musicians who will be playing at the wedding. An engaged couple should contact the parish first to make sure that the church and/or the priest are available for the chosen date BEFORE booking any venues, catering services, or bands for the ceremony.

HOLY ORDERS

The sacrament of Orders is the sacrament whereby a man becomes a bishop, priest, or deacon. The bishop is the minister of this sacrament. Bishops are successors of the Apostles and have the fullness of priestly power. Priests (presbyters) are co-workers of bishops and exercise true priestly authority in a lesser degree. They celebrate the sacraments, offer the sacrifice of the Mass, teach, and govern the Church in union with the bishop. Deacons are ordained for service and assist bishops and priests in works of pastoral charity.

Our parish is committed to promoting the value of ordained ministry and to helping boys and men consider becoming priests. Please contact the pastor or diocesan vocations director if you or someone you know is interested in exploring the possibility of a priestly vocation. Please pray for holy priestly vocations from our parish!

ORDER OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION

It is a big decision to enter the Catholic Faith. In order to assist people in doing this there is a period of introductory classes to instruct people in the teachings of the Faith and explaining what the Church is about. If a person is then interested in becoming a Catholic there is a time of instruction and steps to becoming Catholic that begins in September with the goal of entering the Church the following Easter. If someone is interested in learning more about the Catholic Faith, they are encouraged to call the parish office.

STEWARDSHIP

What identifies a steward? Safeguarding material and human resources and using them responsibly is one answer and so is generous giving of time, talent, and treasure. But being a Christian steward means more. As Christian stewards, we receive God's gifts gratefully, cultivate them responsibly, share them lovingly in justice with others, and return them with increase to the Lord.

We plant seeds knowing they hold hope for the future. We lay foundations, knowing much building must follow. There is a sense of liberation, however, in realizing this. We can do something, and we can do it very well. We can take the first step in making a difference, knowing that we may never see the end of the road, the results of our actions, the recipients of our giving. We receive and offer the gift of hope. The harvest will come.

Many of our days are spent "growing dirt," preparing the soil for future plantings. That is an act of hope. We know we are only workers, not the Master Gardner. Accepting the gifts of silence, light, the guiding Spirit, and hope, we are co-creators of the future, which is in God's hands.

PILLARS OF STEWARDSHIP

The four pillars of stewardship are Hospitality, Prayer, Formation, and Service. These pillars invite parishioners to experience, witness, and live the stewardship way of life in response to their baptismal call to discipleship. Each baptized person is called to give time, talent, and treasure to strengthen these four pillars that support the parish community – your parish community.

STEWARDSHIP EXPECTATIONS

Discipleship calls us to more than membership; it calls us to active stewardship. To support all the ministries of the parish, we need every family's active stewardship. What does stewardship ask of us?

• **Commitment to pray.** That is, actively and regularly attend Mass on weekends and Holy Days of Obligation.

- Commitment to participate. That is, offer their talents and a
 portion of their time to serve the parish community and be a
 part of its fellowship and opportunities for ongoing Christian
 formation.
- Commitment to sacrificially give. That is, generously and proportionately pledge a portion of the "first fruits" of material treasure to support the operation and ministry of the parish church. The goal for Christians is the Biblical tithe (10%) and all are called to strive toward that goal.

All parish families are expected to enshrine these 3 sacrificial commitments through the completion of annual Catholic Stewardship Renewal forms. In addition, parish families must strive to stay current on their commitment in order to be considered active stewards in the parish.

PILLAR OF HOSPITALITY

EXTRAORDINARY MINISTER OF HOLY COMMUNION

Extraordinary ministers of Holy Communion assist those who are ordinary ministers (bishops, priests, and deacons) when necessity requires it. All new Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion will have a training session prior to being assigned. To be considered for this ministry the volunteer must be a Catholic in good standing. It also requires the ability to stand for a period of time and to be able to go up the steps into the sanctuary as well as have a certain dexterity with fingers in order to handle the host.

Group leaders must be baptized, confirmed, and practicing Catholics. Group leaders will be involved in assisting the team from the formation of a confirmation class through the administering of the sacrament of Confirmation by the Bishop. This position would help organize the academic/ Catechesis, stewardship, social and service element of this Sacrament.

MARRIAGE PREPARATION MENTOR COUPLE

This ministry allows married couples in the parish to mentor engaged couples. Mentors and engaged couples meet about two or three times prior to the wedding to visit about daily life in marriage. Meetings can take place wherever the couples feel comfortable – at home, restaurants, or Church. The hope is for the couples to make a connection that helps the engaged/newly married couple to feel more engaged in their church family, form a relationship where they can discuss the realities of marriage and encourage each other to grow in faith. The mentor couple will help the engaged use the results from their assessment in everyday life as well as give advice and encouragement.

PSR — PARISH SCHOOL OF RELIGION CATECHISTS

The Parish School of Religion (PSR) is open to all students, grades K-8. Catechists are needed for the program and are required to have Safe Environment training.

OCIA (ORDER OF CHRISTIAN INITIATION OF ADULTS)

OCIA is the process by which adults who are interested in the Catholic faith journey toward full Communion with the Catholic Church.

Ministering as a sponsor is a great opportunity to help bring others into faith by witnessing to, and sharing your own faith. In journeying with one's catechumen or candidate, the sponsor's faith and prayer life also deepens and is renewed. Being a sponsor is like being a bridge into the

ST. STANISLAUS KOSTKA (1550-1568)

St. Stanislaus was a Polish novice of the Society of Jesus, deeply admired for his extraordinary spirituality, unwavering faith, and devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary and the Infant Jesus. Born into a noble family in Rostkowo, Poland, Stanislaus was the second of seven children. Even as a child, he was marked by his deep piety and strong desire to serve God, which set him apart from others.

At 14, Stanislaus and his older brother Paul were sent to study at a Jesuit college in Vienna. The conditions there were difficult, as the Kostka brothers lived in a boarding house run by a Lutheran landlord hostile to Catholic practices. Despite enduring harsh treatment, isolation, and frequent bouts of illness, Stanislaus maintained his spiritual fervor. He immersed himself in prayer, fasting, and devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary. During a severe illness, he experienced two significant visions: one of St. Barbara bringing him Holy Communion and another of the Blessed Virgin Mary with the Christ Child. In this second vision, Mary placed the Infant Jesus in Stanislaus's arms, a moment that deepened his resolve to join the Jesuits.

Stanislaus faced strong opposition from his family. Nevertheless, he courageously fled Vienna, embarking on a journey of over 450 kilometers to Augsburg and then to Dillingen, where he found refuge with St. Peter Canisius, a prominent Jesuit. Eventually, he reached Rome, where he was accepted into the Jesuit novitiate.

Stanislaus's time as a novice was brief but characterized by profound faith, humility, and an intense love for God. His devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary and the Christ Child was central to his spirituality. On August 15, 1568, the Feast of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary, Stanislaus fell gravely ill. He passed away early the next morning at just 17 years old. His death on the Feast of the Assumption was seen as particularly significant, given his deep devotion to Mary.

Stanislaus was canonized in 1726, and his feast day is celebrated on November 13. He is the patron saint of youth, students, and novices, inspiring many with his purity of heart, steadfast determination, and profound love for the Christ Child and the Blessed Virgin Mary.

ST. STANISLAUS PARISH HISTORY

Prior to 1880, the people of this area were members of the St. Francis Xavier Parish of Taos, Missouri. During those years mass was said once a month, first by Fr. Helias and later by Fr. Gruender, in a small log church on the Frank Schrimpf farm. As the number of Catholic families in this area grew, the people wanted to have their own parish. As the result of this sentiment, a meeting was held in Taos to formally discuss the subject. Mr. Edward Ward, being one of the first settlers to the area and seeing the Baptist settlement disappearing, offered four acres of land for the site of the church.

On November 9th of 1880, under the direction of Fr. John J. Kain of the St. Louis Diocese, the St. Stanislaus Parish was established. The first church was an abandoned Baptist church that was relocated to the new parish. The first pastor was Fr. Henry A. Hukestein who was ordained June 4, 1876. Fr. Hukestein lived in a room added onto the log church and took his meals with the John Tellman Family.

Under Fr. Hukestein's direction plans were made for the erection of a brick church. As the result, the cornerstone was laid on September 7, 1881, by the then Vicar General Fr. Muehisiepan. The brick for the new church was fired on the John Tellman farm. Most of the labor that was needed was furnished by the members of the parish. On October 10,1883, the new church building was blessed by the Reverend Herman Wigger, under the patronage of St. Stanislaus Kosta. After the completion of the new church, the old log church was used as the school and parsonage.

On September 14, 1898, a new two-story school building was completed at the cost of \$4,000. The second floor was used as the residence for the sisters who taught at the school. In 1905, the parish added a new room to the school building. This new addition was used as a classroom and a chapel during the winter.

In 1922, the old church became inadequate to serve the needs of the parish, and a new church was designed by The Ludwig & Dreisoener Architectural Firm of St. Louis. The cornerstone of the new church was blessed on June 17, 1923. The RT. Reverend J.J. Tannrath celebrated

the formal dedication of the new church on June 28, 1925. The splendor of the new structure was short-lived, for on July 28, 1928, lightning struck the steeple. The fire was battled in vain and in the end, only the walls and the stonework of the steeple were left standing. The sisters' house, rectory, and school were saved by the efforts of the parishioners as well as the rain that fell. In June of 1929, reconstruction was completed and services resumed. Although the outside of the church looked much the same as before the fire, a new décor was used on the interior. Windows were installed on both sides of the sanctuary to provide more light. Alters and background of the sanctuary were fashioned of carefully blended woods. The old pews were cleaned, refinished, and re-installed. A hand-carved crucifix and two accompanying statuary figures were purchased and shipped from Germany.

On October 26, 1958, a new school building was dedicated. Originally, this school had four classrooms and a basement that was used as the cafeteria. An addition was added to the west side of the existing structure providing additional space for the school. In the early 1980s, a gymnasium was added to the school facilities. In later years another addition was added to the west end of the gymnasium. The upper floor of this two-story addition provided the parish with a meeting room while the lower floor was used for storage.

In 1991, the St. Stanislaus Church was renovated. New electrical services and central air conditioning were installed. The hardwood floors were stripped, sanded, and resealed. The church pews were refinished. New carpeting was laid in the entryway and sacristy. In 1994, the need for additional class space led to the conversion of the parish meeting room into the kindergarten room. The last unfinished part of the school basement was made into a classroom and an art room during the summer of 1996.

In early 1997, the former convent was torn down to make room for an addition to the school. The addition included seven additional classrooms and restroom/athletic locker facilities off the gymnasium. The project also provided restrooms. The estimated cost of \$750,000 as well as the majority of the labor necessary was furnished by the families of the parish and local businesses. In 2001, another expansion was

completed to furnish a new home for the library and additional classroom space.

In 2005, with the generous support of parishioners and the guidance and planning of the parish cemetery committee, the parish built a mausoleum on the parish cemetery grounds.

Most recently, a renovation of the church was done to brighten the interior and open up the sanctuary area providing a new high altar to centrally house the Tabernacle.

Safe Environment

The Safe Environment Program of the Diocese of Jefferson City was developed to ensure the safety of minors, as required by the United States Conference of Catholic Bishop's (USCCB's) "Charter for the Protection of Children and Young People." There are distinct requirements for parents, volunteers, employees, priests, deacons, religious brother and sisters, seminarians and deacon candidates. Each category and the requirements are listed below.

1.1. Safe Environment Requirements for Adult Employees, Priests, Deacons, Religious Brothers and Sisters, Seminarians and Deacon Candidates

All adult employees, priests, deacons, religious brothers and sisters, seminarians and deacon candidates must accomplish the following prior to engaging in any Church related activities or employment for the diocese:

- complete a Protecting God's Children (VIRTUS) workshop in-person or online and agree to ongoing online training;
- agree to complete a national background screening that evaluates any history related to criminal charges, and agree to automatic rescreening every three months;
- complete the state Family Care Safety Registry background check form; and
- read and consent to the Code of Pastoral Conduct by providing an electronic signature.

1.2. Safe Environment Requirements for Volunteers Whose Duties Involve Contact with Minors

All volunteers whose duties involve contact with minors must accomplish the following prior to volunteering:

- complete a Protecting God's Children (VIRTUS) workshop in-person or online:
- agree to a national background screening that evaluates any history related to criminal charges, and agree to automatic rescreening every three months; and
- read and consent to the Code of Pastoral Conduct.
- **1.2.1.** All K-8 Catholic school parents/guardians are required to complete the requirements in 1.2. Parents/guardians who fail to complete these requirements will not be allowed to enroll their children in Catholic schools. In some instances, the Catholic Schools Office in collaboration with the Office of Child and Youth Protection may grant exemptions to this rule.

1.3. Safe Environment Requirements for Volunteers Whose Duties Do Not Involve Contact with Minors

All volunteers whose duties do not involve contact with minors must accomplish the following prior to volunteering in any Church-related activities:

 complete a Protecting God's Children (VIRTUS) workshop in-person or online;

- agree to a national background screening through the National Sex Offender Registry completed by chancery personnel);and
- read and consent to the Code of Pastoral Conduct.
- **1.3.1.** This category of volunteer must always be accompanied by someone who has completed all requirements for volunteers who work with minors (group 1.2).
- 1.4. Safe Environment Requirements for Volunteers Whose Duties Do Not Involve Contact with Minors and Who Volunteer No More Than One Time Per Calendar Year

All volunteers whose duties do not involve contact with minors and who volunteer no more than one time per calendar year must accomplish the following prior to volunteering in any Church-related activities:

- agree to a national background screening through the National Sex Offender Registry, completed by chancery personnel);
- read and consent to the Code of Pastoral Conduct; and
- complete the Single Occasion Volunteer Form that is available at diojeffcity.org/safe environment.
- **1.4.1.** This category of volunteer must always be accompanied by someone who has completed all requirements for volunteers who work with minors (group 1.2)
